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
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
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Opening doors to rustic beauty of a bygone era

ike many things of beauty, it took time to understand the 150-year-old Burr family farmhouse.

But in the end it was time that yielded episodes of discovery for Daniel Ionescu and Caroline von Reitzenstein, who stayed intent on getting to the core of the home's rustic essence. In a painstaking restoration, they exhumed furnishings left behind by generations of the Burr family, and the relics are now favored as central features at Old Burr Farm and sidedoorgallery.

Not much local history is written about the original farmhouse, located near what is now a western border of Bethel, NY. In 1847, Leslie Burr pointed out the hand-hewn timber beams and clapboard siding that still belong to the farmhouse today. It is unclear who Leslie was, according to Town of Bethel historian Marion Vassmer. Leslie described the house as a one-and-a-half story farmhouse with a summer kitchen, and then in the early 1900s, noted a division of the house into two separate dwellings.

These precious few clues, though valuable and abiding, represent only a brief foreword to what Ionescu and von Reitzenstein have come to appreciate about the farmhouse. They scraped away layers of plaster to uncover what more than 150 years of renovation work had concealed.

In the end, they brought about a modern-day dwelling that is soundly tied to what they found.

An old pantry table discovered in the house became a bathroom vanity. Ionescu and von Reitzenstein resurrected the original porcelain bathtub for their master bathroom, and they washed off an old tool cabinet for use as a cupboard in their dining room.

"One of the reasons we wanted to buy the farmhouse was to be able to connect with a history," said Ionescu, a Romanian-born architect.

The couple built an armoire for

their master bedroom with some of the old boards they found entombed behind the old kitchen walls. Ionescu also built a laundry-room barrier with the salvaged boards.

"It's our way of preserving the past, which I think is important for all of us to relate to," Ionescu said.

Familiarity with the home's 150-year-old identity can be enjoyed while passing through the interior doorways of the farmhouse. Ionescu and von Reitzenstein reclaimed and preserved the home's original doors, allowed their faded colors to remain and even

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

influence their decorative choices in the refurbished rooms.

They found a collection of old books, many of them German prayer books, which are now piled on an old dresser they found discarded. They discovered two pianos, old trunks here and there, and two armchairs, which they had re-upholstered.

From the beginning the couple started doing the work on their own, but they eventually needed a contractor to manage jobs requiring special tools, like saving the old barn that had collapsed into the back of the house. A hired carpenter labeled each board of the barn and reassembled it about 50 feet from the farmhouse.

At one point their contractor abandoned the project, and Ionescu and von Reitzen-

stein resumed working on the house alone. As the saying goes, when one door closes, another one opens.

"Then I started to do things on my own. That's how I started to look into preserving 150 years of renovations of the house," Ionescu said.

He said he doesn't at all regret the window of time between contractors because the void left him with time to work through the restoration with the kind of diligence that he craved.

"We enjoyed doing that, working on it the way it should."

As von Reitzenstein aptly pointed out, "Sometimes it takes a while for a house to speak to you and tell you what it is."

When they bought the property a few

years ago, Ionescu observed that while the farmhouse was made up of a series of little rooms, it was also naturally divided into observable halves; each side represented a distinctive personality, and the couple decided that the house should be restored to embody what Ionescu calls a "mother-daughter concept."

One side is private and one is public in concept, though not exclusively.

"The house inspired me. I knew it was a mother-daughter house. We wanted to do the house that way, keeping the kitchen and master bedroom private. The other side is public, for guests and the gallery," he said.

In 2004, sidedoorgallery at Old Burr Farm was chosen as a finalist for Best Residential Renovation in the Sullivan County Showcase Awards.

The gallery, on the north side of the house, features a permanent display of Ionescu's photography, "Images of Sullivan County." Many of his photographs capture Sullivan County architecture, particularly agricultural images, such as the many distinctively large chicken coops that can be found within a five-mile radius of the farmhouse. Other photographs give attention to numerous local barns that have been mended over the years with a patchwork of available materials.

A statement in the gallery reads, "Dan's work reflects not only his personal visual commentary on an area he has long adopted as his second home, but harkens to a deeper, underlying resonance that permeates life in similar, small communities across our country and throughout the world."

The spacious gallery, located where the old kitchen used to be, also has on display a collection of Roberto Rabanne's photographs taken at the original 1969 Woodstock Festival, which took place just a few miles from Old Burr Farm.

"We feel fortunate to be close to a piece of history," von Reitzenstein said about Woodstock.

From the beginning of his architectural training in Romania at the early age of 13, Ionescu was taught to design anything from a pencil to a cathedral. No matter how small the object, he was educated to put substantial thought into its design.

He later graduated from Pratt Institute in 1987, a school that provides an international approach to design and architecture, he said.

In February 2005, Ionescu designed a stainless steel cradle to protect a celebrated pair of red-tailed hawks, Pale Male and Lola, from being evicted from their nest on a landmark-designated building in New York City. Working with the National Audubon Society, he captured the hearts of bird watchers around the nation. The challenge was to construct a platform capable of supporting the nest as well as securing it in place away from the surface of the building façade in order to alleviate the damaging effects of the

The project alleviated public concern and allowed the hawks to rebuild their nest. In one sense, it is one more manifestation of Ionescu's deep appreciation for the value of familiarity in any living space.

Every window on the front of the house at Old Burr Farm-framed by heavy hand-hewn trim—is original.

Walking on the same floors their forbears walked on, gazing out the same windows, bathing in the same porcelain tub—these represent the intimate rapport Ionescu and von Reitzenstein wanted with their Sullivan County farmhouse.

The rustic appointments give Old Burr Farm a pure and fine aesthetic.

Standing in the master bedroom on a bright, late-winter afternoon—high on the south side of the two-story farmhouse, the room receives sun all day-Ionescu said, "We chose the place, and life slowed down a bit."

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
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Stimulate your senses this spring






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

'Forsythe House' of Milford is reborn

We always thought Milford was a cute little town. You can walk just about anywhere—to the pharmacy, the coffee shop, the dry cleaner, to a collection of shops along the main street.

he sagging floor needed shoring up; the water-stained ceilings were falling down. But Brian and Ingrid Pimley sensed something special about the spacious old Queen Anne Victorian house in Milford, PA.

Maybe it was the grand foyer with its hidden sliding pocket doors, or the ornate ash staircase curling from the foot of the huge fireplace crafted from imported Italian brick. One thing is certain: despite the grime and neglect, the Pimleys saw the home's potential.

Built in the late 1800s as a summer home by Margaret Hart, the house was sold after several years to the Forsythe family, who passed it down through several generations. When the family finally sold it, the home was converted into two apartments and rented

for the decade before the Pimleys made their proud purchase three years ago.

"

By that time, the building had fallen into substantial disrepair. Impressive wraparound porches on the first and second stories had been demolished. Peeling paint, crumbling plaster, uneven floors and exposed plumbing and wires backtold a sorry tale of absent caretaking.

But all that was about to change the day the Pimleys pushed open the worn but solid wooden door.

"It felt like the house was saying, 'Save me! Help me!'" said Ingrid. Nodding, Brian added, "We had to see through the dinginess. But I always dreamed of having a big house."

At 4,200 square feet, with four and one-half bathrooms, six bedrooms, a kitchen, living room, dining room and pantry, that dream has been realized. But the path from dream to reality was comprised of hard work, focused effort, careful prioritizing, substantial stamina, and even sacrifice. "I sold one of my best guitars to afford the granite kitchen coun-

ter we wanted," admitted Brian.

Their band, Frilly Lizard, recorded its CD "Dancin' On the Water" in 2000. Ingrid writes the lyrics and plays bass, and Brian writes the music and

The couple sold their Jefferson, NJ home in an inflated market, allowing them to afford their new home and its initial renovation. Brian, 41, is vice president of Filtrex Inc., a company specializing in largescale pool filters. He usually works from home, enabling him to care for Evan and take pride in playing "Mr. Mom." Ingrid, 36, commutes to a job as a systems engineer for medical device manufacturer Becton Dickinson.

The couple lived in the home's third floor apartment while they worked on the first and second stories. They completed much of the work themselves, but found a local carpenter, Al Perlowski, who wasn't daunted by the challenges inherent to renovating an old house. Perlowski reconstructed the porches based upon an original 1898 photo of the house, and tackled many other interior projects.

When the ceilings were removed, the wall surfaces began crumbling, revealing an absence of insulation, which Brian and Ingrid took pains to correct. Three 30yard dumpsters later, their home was stripped to its bones, then renovated with a respectful nod at restoration, balanced with a practical desire to create a livable home.

"While we definitely enjoy the character and details of its age and history, we're not aiming so much for authenticity, but livabil-

ity. We don't want to spend our lives trying to keep the old faucets working," laughed Ingrid.

"A lot of people say we've done 10 years worth of work in two years," Brian said. "We tried to renovate and make it look like everything belonged."

The Pimleys have other important matters to consider. Their son, Evan, now 2, tops the list.

"We want Evan to be from a good place and we think Milford will be a great place for him to grow up. There's so much to do outdoors. The Delaware River is only a block away; you can go boating, swimming, camping or hiking," Ingrid enthused.

Ingrid's parents, Peter and Alice Jane Loewrigkeit, live near Milford in Twin Lakes, Shohola, PA. The Pimleys would visit them on weekends and liked what they saw.

"We spent a weekend at the Black Bear Film Festival and had a great time. We realized that this was a great town for a lot of different reasons, including good cultural opportunities and local interest in preservation and restoration. So we began looking at homes. Although we were scheduled to see a different house, we noticed a paper on the realtor's desk and asked about it. It turned out to be our future home, and the first home we looked

at," related Ingrid.

Renovating a community eyesore in a small town has its rewarding moments. People have been very supportive and interested in the project, even stopping by to ask questions or take a quick tour.

"People's enthusiasm kept us going," Brian said.

One day, a truck pulled up and a man stepped out with his dog. He walked up to Brian, passed him the dog's leash and said, "I have something for you." He handed over some photos and antique postcards depicting the Pimley's home in days gone by.


It was Skip Gregory, a former Milford mayor, just making a house

"That's one of the best things about it," said Ingrid. "Milford seems to be a place that brings out the good in people. We always thought it was a cute little town. You can walk just about anywhere - to the pharmacy, the coffee shop, the dry cleaner, to a collection of shops along the main street. And there are lots of interesting alleys to explore. When we walk the baby to the park, we see people we've come to know and they just seem friendlier here. It's cozy, homey and authentic. The houses have character. It's got a sense of place and history that's real, not manufactured. We're happy to have found a place that's not like the places we're from."

As the Pimleys and their son weave their lives into the fabric that is Milford, their home anchors them firmly in the town's ongoing his-

"We saw it in its worst state; we knew it needed work. We got a lot of opinions and took our time. You can't panic over every little thing. You need to calculate the costs, but it comes down to a feeling and this feels right," affirmed Ingrid. And despite all the effort, time and sweat equity, Brian agrees. 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
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Making waves in a red-hot market

A look at the inner workings of our real estate economy

It's time to buy a house. You know the market is hot. You know each passing day brings higher prices. You have confidence that the region's real estate values are poised for a long climb up.

Or maybe you own a home and those higher taxes mean one thing—the value of your largest asset is appreciating, moving up, making retirement look easier and displacing the memory of a decade of housing stag-

By now, even those residents far removed from the daily hustle of real estate gossip understand that the local and regional economies are growing in ways not seen for quite some time. The rejuvenation is putting money in the pockets of a broad array of residents, businesses and employees.

Opportunities abound.



Impact of real estate

One essential factor to remember about a vibrant real estate market is that individual transactions and decisions broadly affect a region.

Historically, home sales and construction have served as forecasting tools for what is happening and what is about to happen to an area's economy. Real estate—even cheap real estate—is expensive, and buying a home entails a long-term commitment to an area. Similarly, fixing up or adding onto a home usually means the homeowner has confidence in a region's prospects. And confidence is contagious and self-perpetuating. Not everyone wants to plunk down their life's savings into an unproven investment, but once the rumors swirl about the money being made, more and more people who manage their money conservatively are willing to buy a piece of the pie.

The ingredients of a growing economy may seem mysterious but really are simple once the recipe is broken down into the impact of everyday decisions made by you and me.

Like a stone tossed into a still lake, a buyer's decision to purchase an old farmhouse, fix it up and spend his weekends there with his family ripples outward from where the stone enters the water.

Individual decisions, collective benefit

Mr. and Mrs. Jones, hypothetical city slickers, hear about this place two hours from the metropolitan region. Being somewhat shrewd and savvy

with their money—and never entirely comfortable with the economic health of a very expensive city real estate market—they decide to diversify their real estate portfolio. After a bit of research, they chooses the Delaware River Valley and its surrounding region, which they feel is the most undervalued area that meets their prerequisites, those being the area's proximity to the city and its relatively low costs.

They begin to research the area and eventually tour around. They also begin talking about the area to their friends and associates, beginning the soft, casual sell that is much more effective than the slickest chamber of commerce brochure.

They finally find an old house on 20 acres and pay \$400,000 for it. Along the way, they have hired a local attorney, a local surveyor, a local title company and maybe got financing from a local bank. They have paid real estate commission to a local real estate company and probably hired a local home inspector. Their taxes are higher than the previous homeowner's, providing the local municipality with more revenue. Through one decision to buy a home, two individuals have affected the region's economy.

Take 30 transactions per week, 120 per month, 1,440 per year, and you start to see the dramatic impact these hardly isolated decisions drive forward on a young economic landscape.

The Joneses, however, are just beginning. They now need to renovate and update their home, do some landscaping, build a barn for the old truck and tractor they bought when they got carried away at a local auction, purchase furniture for an entire house, hire a guy to mow their lawn, hire a house cleaner, buy appliances, hire a snow plow guy, etc. All the while, their friends and associates continue to hear about this grand adventure and amazing place—this experiment in frontier living only two hours from the city where a gentleman's farm costs less than a nice one-bedroom apartment in the city.



Business spending

The impact of business spending is of course much more dramatic than an individual's spending. The Joneses may end up buying a lawn mower, but a busy landscape company might buy

four of them, plus a trailer to haul them and a truck to tow the trailer. The landscaper, a hard worker as well as a good salesman, might land four new accounts, might need some local bank financing, and might need to hire four more employees next year. Because his competitor is also a good businessman, he will need to compete for these workers, driving up wages, increasing the spending power of each of his new employees and putting more money in the pockets of his workers.

This newly hired worker with cash in his/her pocket now has more money to spend and may decide to build that garage she has been dreaming of, or buy a new washer and dryer, or upgrade her house or buy a car for the child who just turned 17 and got all As on a report card.

The ripple effects continue to swirl throughout the economy. Former President Reagan called this phenomenon "trickle-down economics," but in a truly heated economic environment, the effects can be more like a mountain waterfall in springtime when the winter's snow is melting.

A construction company probably impacts an economy like no other business. Building a house entails the hiring of dozens of companies, working together, working individually, intensely utilizing the area's resources, pushing suppliers for better pricing and faster service. Architects, engineers, surveyors, framers, plumbers, electricians, masons, carpenters, painters and landscapers—all with more work, more cash flow, more incentive to work harder and grow their businesses—take a chance, because for the first time in a generation, tomorrow has a chance of being better than today.



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

Economic growth spurs challenges

Good news seldom travels alone, and an overheated economy can bring bad tidings in the way of higher prices, slower service and a

general scarcity of labor, be it for a homeowner trying to find a plumber or a plumber trying to find a new good employee at a wage he can afford to pay.

Quickly rising real estate values cause alarm among new homebuyers. The overloaded and overworked infrastructure of banks, attorneys, surveyors and other professionals gets bogged down, turning the purchase of a home into a test of perseverance and patience. Planning boards and building inspectors-all unpaid or underpaid-find it hard to address all the concerns and requests. Contractors learn the hard way that being too busy can be as dangerous to the health of their business as not being busy enough. Businesses across the economic spectrum intensely compete for new help.



Good help is hard to find

Be it a homeowner looking for a contractor or a contractor looking for a carpenter, finding and retaining help is never easy and is especially difficult in a red-hot market.

Being a builder myself, I remember when my construction business just started to thrive. One of my carpenters - an all-around tradesman with masonry skills as well – was full of great attributes. While he was generally happy and liked where he worked, a chance encounter with a contractor at Home Depot evolved into a lucrative job offer. Before I knew it, this carpenter gave me his two-week's notice. I thought about matching the offer, but when I learned it was nearly double what I was paying, I stopped attempting to lure him back. Consequently, I was in a position where I could barely keep up with scheduled work, let alone think about adding new customers.

Similarly, the customer is also affected. The contractor that paid my carpenter unheard-of wages had to pass these costs onto his customer, and my company that lost a carpenter could not keep up with its workload.

Perversely, as prices for goods and services escalate, the wage earners that are earning more money find that rising prices have diminished their spending power, creating a cat-chasing-its-tail scenario.

This is an economy of inflation, where more money buys less.

Small towns, national trends

While individual decisions greatly impact a region's prospects, national (and even international) events also play a role in sustaining or restraining an area's economy. America's punitive tariffs on soft-wood imports from

Canada raise the cost of building a house. The Federal Reserve Board's decision to raise interest rates takes money out of the pockets of homeowners and

businesses alike. The World Trade Center tragedy shot insurance rates through the roof, forcing businesses to decide to be properly insured or to hire another worker. A war in the Middle East that causes oil prices to double affects every type of

These unseen forces can cause bedlam for a small business or homeowner because the effects are gradual and largely unseen. But subtly, bills become harder to pay and monthly balance sheets show less profit than they should, considering how busy the contractor seems.



Speed, quality or price

While participating in this type of economic environment can seem a bit like a Darwinian jungle, adhering to an old business rule can provide some much needed solace. The rule states that a provider of ser-

vices – be it a construction company or a graphic design company – can deliver a product with two of the following three attributes: speed, quality or price. The company can provide a good service fast while sacrificing a low price; it can deliver a good service at a low price while sacrificing speed; or it can deliver a mediocre or poor service fast at a low price. But it can only very rarely deliver a quality product, quickly, at a low price.

Anyone who is consuming real estate or home improvement products in a fast moving economy will be at an advantage to remember this golden rule.

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
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
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

uilding a medicinal garden close to the house and combining with it vegetables and ornamentals that are also not frequently eaten by wildlife provides a source of beauty and can improve the value of your property.

A few hundred years before medicine became a specialty or even a profession, healing herbs were grown in monasteries and by village "wise" women (who were a little like the wise guys of today). The word "physician" comes from physic, an herb or mineral that focuses on the digestive system.

Medicinal herbs have a long blooming period, are fragrant and often deer resistant.

Herbs like a sunny exposure with rare exceptions (like comfrey, which will grow anywhere in anything). They prefer sandy loam, but we have heavy clay around these parts. The easiest way to conquer this problem is to construct a raised bed, using a step design (see inset on page 29).

If your house is built on a hill, carve narrow terraces and face the steps with stone or brick as mini-retaining walls. If your terrain is flat, it's possible to use this design by creating a wall behind the steps. The wall becomes a charming screen edging a path from the house on which clematis or other vines grow. Thyme cascades over the wall, becoming easily available for culinary uses. Parsley is best grown in pots or windowsills because it is deer caviar. And if it's in a pot, it can be over wintered indoors.

Though a life of retreat offers various joys,

Four or five railway ties (available at local lumber yards) should be sufficient to create the wall's height. Measure and drill holes on either end of the wood so that one or two metal rods (used to reinforce concrete) run through the holes and are hammered a foot into the soil to stabilize the retaining wall.

On the garden side, construct steps by building stone or brick "cribs," and fill with rubble, garden debris or newspapers (any refugee from the dump will do). Top off the steps with one-third sand, one-third ordinary topsoil and one-third compost. Sand is usually available at the transfer station, free if hauled away.

The advantage of a terrace plan is an easy-to-care for garden with the spontaneity of a cottage garden but without the cluttered design. A labor-intensive alternative (see inset on page 29) is the classic knot design, a formal garden that can be edged with boxwood or small-leaf holly.

Certain herbs repel insects and aid the growth of other plants. Fennel is the exception, which will retard the growth of beans, tomatoes and kohlrabi. Stinging

nettle and yarrow, grown near herbs, increase their aroma by increasing the amount of essential oils. Chamomile and borage increase neighboring plants resistance to disease. Basil planted around a rose bush repels aphids. Feverfew inter-planted between rows of carrots deters carrot fly.

Adding "weedy" herbs such as comfrey, dandelion, nettle and yarrow to compost accelerates the breakdown of other plant components and adds minerals.

Using the aroma of herbs for healing has had a long tradition. Angelica is uplifting, strengthening and invigorating. Basil is calming, pain-relieving and antiseptic. Chamomile is calming, sleep-inducing and pacifying. Clary-sage is relaxing, uplifting and euphoric. Coriander/cilantro is invigorating, stimulating and pain-relieving. Fennel is cleansing, refreshing and relaxing. Honeysuckle is romantic, relaxing and calming. Hops is sleep-inducing, relaxing and mentally strengthening. Jasmine is sensual, reassuring and calming.

Lavender is insect-repellent, antiseptic and calming. Lemon balm is insect-repellent, strengthening and calming. Marjoram is comforting and strengthening. Mint clears the head and is refreshing. Rosemary is uplifting and invigorating. Thyme is antiseptic, insect repellent, warming and strengthening. Violet is sleep-inducing, calming, soothing and cooling.

Planting an aromatic herb garden is sensual and promotes health. The tiny oil-secreting glands can often be seen as tiny pinprick dots when the leaf is held up to the light. The oils are released when the flowers or leaves are brushed against or rubbed between the fingers. Some herbs like angelica, lavender, thyme

and elder are released by the warmth of the sun.


The following is a partial list of herbs that will grow well in a pot or in the terraced garden: angelica, artemisia, basil, black cohosh, borage. chives, catmint, chamomile, calendula, chives, comfrey, cilantro, coriander, dill, echinacea, fennel, heather and heath, horse radish, hyssop, inulin, lavender, lemon balm, lovage, marjoram, milk thistle, mint, meadowsweet, marsh mallow, motherwort, mullein, nasturtium, New Jersey tea, parsley, primula, pulsatilla, purple sage, rosemary, rue, shiso, skullcap, stevia, strawberry, stinging nettle, tarragon, thyme, valerian, viola, yarrow. These cultivars are interplanted with tomato, gourd, cucumber and squash. 
cucumber wander here and there to fill empty spaces.

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Completely organized recycling

o many, recycling is a way of life – which makes perfect sense.

With plastics being made from precious and dwindling oil reserves and our nation's shrinking landfill space, we are challenged as responsible consumers to expend a bit of energy and cultivate awareness to reduce, reuse and recycle. From take-out containers to highly engineered zip-lock plastic bags, we are constantly bombarded with either the specter of burgeoning waste disposal bills or managing the clutter of saving and re-using useful containers.

And it takes a bit of organization to manage the flow of recycling through our households.

The Barrett and Henriksen household in Narrowsburg, NY has recycling down to a science. Helle Henriksen lives with her nine-year-old son Winter and husband Niall Barrett, a furniture-maker and editor. They recycle everything from newspaper, junk mail, chipboard products like pasta boxes, cans, clear glass, colored glass and number 1 and 2 plastics that are recycled easily in either Wayne or Sullivan County.

"I even give some of the five and sixes to friends from New Jersey who can recycle them in their community, but you have to draw the line somewhere," Henriksen said with laugh.

"Recycling was a big thing for a while when the county started its program in the 1990s," she said, "but I'm not sure that people are as concerned now. As citizens, and as a nation, we could do better. If there were more incentives for busi-

ness and the government to recycle we could take recycling a whole lot farther."

And taking recycling to its most organized and complete level is what Henriksen excels at.

A stainless steel covered bucket sits on her kitchen counter for kitchen scraps and the compost bin. An open cabinet of buckets and shelves in a room just off the kitchen take the glass, plastic and paper on a temporary basis. There, Henriksen also stores returnable bottles and number 5, 6 and 7 plastics to give to the local tackle shop to use as bait containers.

"I use the plastic bags that I get from the store to line my kitchen garbage can; they just seem to be the right size. I don't really have that many bags because I take a canvas bag to the grocery store."

Henriksen said recycling was handed down as tradition from her mother in Denmark.

"Whenever we tore off a piece of aluminum foil, my mother would always advise us to be frugal. She would ask, 'Do you know how much of the world's resources go into making that product?'

"My mother actually saves things that I throw away," Henriksen said. "I wash out heavy [self-closing] plastic bags, but if they are really gross, I'll just throw them away. At some point you say, 'I don't have enough time and energy to recycle everything.'

"Still, as responsible consumers I can't help but think that if we all were to use something that we would normally throw away, even just one more time, we would cut down on our consumption of natural resources and save room in our landfills."





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
